We are a very diverse school with students and families from around the world. We have over 15 first languages spoken by our students and families. Our focus is on student belonging, well-being, and a high level of academic success for all students. We have 48 wonderful staff members who put students first and do all they can to ensure that KG is a wonderful school in which to learn and work. We are proud of our ability to collaborate and focus on what is best for each student.

Tipi Outdoor Classroom

In the spring of 2024, King George embarked on a journey to address the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action. We wanted to create an outdoor classroom to enhance students' learning. The tipi outdoor classroom is designed to welcome our students and staff as well as community members. It represents our school's commitment to truth and reconciliation as well as serves as a reminder that we are all welcome and represented in our curriculum and schools. Our project began with students learning about the significance of the tipi and Treaty 4. Each classroom had a specific part they researched and contributed to our collective knowledge and understanding. The topics ranged from what each pole of the tipi means to traditional and present-day uses of the tipi. While this learning was happening, we developed plans to have a tipi outdoor classroom built on the playground at the school. We worked with a local developer to create a unique base for the tipi to sit on. This also includes a ramp so that the tipi outdoor classroom can be accessible to all. For this company, it is the first project of its kind. The tipi is over 24 feet in diameter and over 23 feet tall. The canvas is handmade and came from Swan River, Manitoba. Seven staff members have been trained to put up the tipi and take it down. It is a major accomplishment as the poles and canvas are large and heavy!



We were able to enjoy the tipi outdoor classroom at the start of the 2024-2025 school year. We had an opening ceremony for it on September 30th, with classrooms learning about Turtle Island as well as other topics. The students have enjoyed learning outside in the tipi. We have taken it down for the winter season but will be put up again once the spring weather is here.



KG Land Acknowledgement 2024

Mrs. Haug's grade 6 classroom created a land acknowledgment that is specific to King George School.

On June 6, we had a large celebration and community gathering as we raised our tipi. We had several special guests, including Elder Alvin Francis from Nekaneet First Nation and the Buffalo Drum Group from Regina. We had a program where students shared their learning. Elder Alvin smudged the tipi and provided a traditional Cree blessing.The Buffalo Drum Group shared their dancing and drumming. We ended the celebration by having soup and bannock, which was prepared by the grade 5 classrooms. It was a great day of learning and growing together in Reconciliation.



We acknowledge that we are on Treaty 4 territory, the traditional lands of the Cree (Plains and Blackfoot), the Dakota, Lakota, Saulteaux Nations, and the homeland of the Metis; these nations stewarded the land from time immemorial. In honour of true Truth and Reconciliation, we recognize the hurts and mistakes of the past and will work towards transforming our words into actions to change the future by sharing our history to ensure it does not repeat itself. We will work together to reconcile and build relationships with all treaty people and the land. We would also like to acknowledge the traditional languages and ways of all Indigenous people that are important to their culture and identity and what an honour it is to learn from them as it helps us all, as treaty people learn and grow. We are thankful for the privilege of sharing this land and for the opportunity to grow, learn, live, and play here on Treaty 4 land together as a community of treaty people.

Extra Curricular Clubs

Our staff works hard to offer a variety of clubs and sports that meet and help develop our student's interests and passions. This year we have close to 50 students participating in the Art Club and over 100 students in the Drama Club. Students in Drama Club are either part of the crew or are performers. Our Global Guardians are a service-oriented group of students devoted to promoting recycling and taking care of the earth. Our Student Leadership Council is open to leadership-minded students in grades 7 and 8. These students plan and organize special events and help promote good citizenship around the school. We also have a big Safety Patrol club who helps students to cross the street safely after school. They are a committed and responsible group of students who have learned to follow a schedule, watch over their peers, and show up no matter what the weather is like. We offer a Chess Club for students who enjoy competition and strategy. Girls Group provides an opportunity for students to develop positive social connections and self-esteem. We have a busy Debate Club where students learn about the fine art of communicating and defending their point of view and finally, a Choir Club which includes 20 students from grades 3-8.



School Community Council (SCC)

Many of our members have been on our SCC for several years. They are a dedicated group of parents who work with us to promote parent engagement, offer hot lunches and special events for our students, and support our school goals - especially reading. They are amazing people to work with and we are lucky to have such great support!





Sports

King George offers a variety of sporting choices for our students. In the fall, we have cross country and volleyball for students in grades 6-8 (for the A teams) and grades 5-8 (for the B teams). In our cross-country events, we have several students who finish in the top 3 in their age groups. After Christmas comes the start of basketball season. This year, we have 2 boys' teams and one girls team. In January, we host our Cougar Classic with our teams playing Lindale and Westmount. The King George Cougars won the Cougar Classic last year and hope to continue the streak this year. As well as basketball, curling is offered to students in the winter months. They spend the first part of the season learning about the game and will spend the remaining part playing games against other schools in Moose Jaw. The season will end with a bonspiel. Badminton starts in the spring with league play. The students can decide to play as a single or as a double. Our sports season ends with track and field. The grades 7 and 8 students can join our competitive track team with an all-day track event at Gutheridge Field. For our younger students, the students in grades 4-6 participate in the standard track meet at Gutheridge Field where they can choose between running, throwing, jumping or field events.


